Stewart Adams

Inventor of Ibuprofen

- 1. Adams was born in Byfield, Northamptonshire, England.
- 2. He was the son of a train driver.
- 3. He started his working relationship with Boots Pure Drug Co. as a three-year apprentice.
- 4. Adams' first job after receiving his degree was in Boots' penicillin production unit, in the early days of penicillin when it was grown in milk bottles.
- 5. Adams often tested compounds on himself.
- 6. He said, "I always felt that if you were going to ask volunteers to take a drug and later patients, you ought to be prepared to take it yourself."
- 7. In 1983, Adams officially retired from the research department at Boots, where he was head of pharmaceutical sciences.
- 8. He lectured widely on ibuprofen and related topics.
- 9. Adams died in January 2019 in Nottingham, England.
- 10. Adams had 14 U.S. patents.
